

HReflection for Father's Day

This celebration gives us reason to pause, to pray for, and to reflect on our Fathers whom we honour. On this Father's Day, we celebrate, congratulate, and pray for the men who continue to reflect the Divine qualities of fatherhood as they lovingly establish, nourish, and maintain their families. Fathers are a blessing, and we thank them for blessing us with lives of dedication, endurance, and love. The historical, traditional observance most like Father's Day was the ancient Roman Parentalia, which lasted from the 13th to the 22nd of February. This festival was a time of remembrance, commemorating departed parents and kinsfolk. The ceremonies were held to 'appease the souls of fathers.' The annual observance became a family reunion. Members gathered to offer wine, milk, honey, oil, and water at flower-decorated graves. At the concluding ceremony, the Caristia, much celebrating went on, as the living relatives feasted together. The originator of a specific 'Father's Day' celebration was Mrs. Sonora Dodd in the United States. The idea of a Father's Day celebration came to her while listening to a sermon on Mother's Day in 1909. Her own father, William Jackson Smart, had raised his six children (Mrs. Dodd and her five brothers), alone and with great love — after his young wife had died. The sacrifices her father made called to mind the unsung feats of fathers everywhere. Mrs. Dodd's idea was approved by her Church and publicized by the YMCA. Internationally, Father's Day is often associated with International Men's Day. Germany has one of the most unique celebrations. It takes place on Ascension Day, which is forty days after Easter. Many countries with a large Catholic community honour godfathers and saints who were father figures. Brazil's Father's Day honours Saint Joachim, patriarch of the holy family, as well as Saint Joseph, in order to celebrate the Feast of Saint Joseph the Worker on the same day. Honouring St. Joseph on Father's Day is common within the Catholic religion, as he is the stepfather of Jesus Christ, his legacy. So, as we reflect on the many traditions and celebrations from around the world, that have led to Father's Day for us, we honour all the fathers and significant men in our lives who have passed away. We give thanks for those who have made sacrifices for our families. We celebrate the godfathers, saints, and father figures in our lives. And we express our gratitude for the workers and the stepfathers making a difference every day. We pray for all our fathers:

We pray for young fathers newly embracing their vocation;


May they find courage and perseverance to balance work, family, and faith in joy and sacrifice.



Where we start our lives in terms of where we live, the resources available to us, and the opportunities presented to us make a significant difference to our life outcomes. Where we start as a service sector in offering children and their families support and assistance makes a significant difference to life outcomes. Where we start as decision makers in addressing large complex policy problems such as child abuse and neglect, also has a significant personal, social and economic outcome. We invite you to use this theme to explore and talk about the many ways that 'where we start matters' for children, young people and their families. Of course where we start isn't where we finish. The aim of Child Protection Week is to bring together partners to focus on addressing the significant harms being experienced by children in Australia. By working collectively to change the trajectory of these children and families, we can reduce the number of children who may come in contact with the child protection system. The time to act is now.

Some parishioners from our parish volunteer their time and love at Cana to assist those who are in such great need for the practical care of others.



Background on the Gospel Reading (Loyola Press)

Today we move ahead in our reading of Matthew's Gospel. Last week we read about Jesus walking on the water and the disciples' confession of faith that Today's Gospel continues the story that began in last week's Gospel. Simon Peter was called the "rock" upon which Jesus would build his Church, and yet Peter continues to show the limitations of his understanding of Jesus' identity. Now that the disciples have acknowledged that Jesus is the Messiah, Jesus confides in them the outcome of his ministry: he must suffer and die in Jerusalem to be raised on the third day. Peter rejects this prediction, and Jesus

rebukes him severely, calling him "Satan." In opposing this aspect of Jesus' mission, Peter shows that he is no longer speaking based on the revelation from God but as a human being. Jesus then teaches all of the disciples about the difficult path of discipleship: to be Christ's disciple is to follow in his way of the cross. Peter could not yet understand what it meant to call Jesus the Messiah. It is unlikely that the other disciples understood any better. Messianic expectations were a common aspect of first-century Judaism. Under Roman occupation, many in Israel hoped and prayed that God would send a Messiah to free the Jews from Roman oppression. The common view was that the Messiah would be a political figure, a king that would free Israel from Roman rule. This is perhaps what Peter envisioned when he was led to recognize Jesus as the Messiah. In this passage, however, Jesus is beginning to teach his disciples that he would be the Messiah in a different way. Jesus would be more like the suffering servant described by the prophet Isaiah than the political liberator. Those who would be Jesus' disciples would be called to a similar life of service. Perhaps this is what Peter feared most in Jesus' prediction of his Passion. He whom Jesus had called "rock" would also be called upon to offer himself in sacrifice and service to others. Christian leaders today are still called to sacrifice and serve others as Jesus did.



Family Connection: Peter was expecting a Messiah that would carry out a different plan than the one Jesus had explained. Jesus was indeed the Messiah, but his life and death would show a different understanding of what it means to be the Messiah. We too have expectations of God and our own ideas about what we think God ought to be doing in our world. Like Peter we may risk limiting our image of God by thinking only in human ways. God's plan is always more than we can ever imagine. As you gather as a family, talk about what we expect God to be doing in our world and in our family life. Then read today's Gospel, Matthew 16:21-27. Why do you think Peter was so upset by what Jesus was saying? Notice how Jesus reprimands Peter. Do we sometimes forget to let God be God for us? That is, do we sometimes get discouraged because God doesn't act in our world

in the ways that we expect? Pray together that your family will remember that God is always working for the world's salvation in ways that are beyond our human imaginings. Conclude by praying together today's Psalm, Psalm 63.



IMPORTANT MESSAGE FROM FATHER JOHN REGARDING WWC SAFEGUARDING COMPLIANCE





Guardian (OCG) which were passed into law in January 2023 and are now mandatory. In keeping with the legislation the OCG will conduct audits to ensure that organisations, including Parishes, are compliant and child safe. Every non-compliance potentially carries a fine of \$18,000 per offence. Dianne Dawson & Helen Williamson are our Parish Safeguarding Officers and I would ask you to respond as generously and quickly as possible to any of their requests of you, so that our community is the safest place possible. The new legislation requires everyone who volunteers in our churches to comply. Failure to do so, means that you will no longer be permitted to continue the wonderful work you have undertaken for many years at St Martha's. We want and need people to remain volunteering across all ministries. The initial process to become fully compliant is a minor inconvenience and staff are on hand to assist you at any stage if you require assistance. Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. 'Heaven preserve you, Lord,' he said. 'This must not happen to you.' But he turned and said to Peter, 'Get behind me, Satan! You are an obstacle in my path, because the way you think is not God's way but man's.'

Then Jesus said to his disciples, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. CHALLENGES OF DISCIPLESHIP

As we listen to Jeremiah pouring his heart out to the Lord, it is not unusual for us to be somewhat embarrassed by his candour. It is as though we are eavesdropping on a very personal and private conversation between the suffering prophet and the God who has commissioned him. There is an enormous battle in the heart of Jeremiah as he wrestles with the message he must proclaim and the impact his preaching has on his own life.

Last week Peter was praised because he had come to understand that Jesus was the Christ, the Son of the living God. Now he must learn what the consequences mean for Jesus and then for those who follow in his footsteps as disciples. His well-meaning attempt to protect Jesus is misguided and like Jeremiah, he must struggle to accept the paradoxical and costly ways of God.

The Christians of Rome are encouraged by Paul to continue with the struggle to live a life of faith in a world that did not share their values and vision. In a world where there were many temples, gods and sacrificial banquets, Paul goes to the heart of the matter when he calls for an offering of one's life as a living sacrifice to God.

All the readings for today converge in laying the challenge before us of not losing heart, even though at times the difficulties might seem beyond our strength. Making our own the mind of Christ is not easy, but then again, it never was.
