

May Weapons Fall Silent (adapted)

October 7 was a day of immense horror. Terror came to Israel when Palestinian militants attacked people attending a music festival and stormed a number of kibbutzim. Hundreds of women, men and children were slaughtered and many were taken hostage. Since that time, the Israeli Defence Force has launched air strikes on Gaza, where hostages were taken by Hamas militants, and ordered Palestinians to evacuate the north prior to the launching of a ground incursion aiming to eliminate



Hamas. The Pope recently noted that a humanitarian crisis is emerging in Gaza. More adults and children are being killed in the on-going missile strikes and the diminished supply of food, water, medicines and other medical supplies, and fuel is worsening the crisis. The Pope is also concerned about the conflict spreading to other parts of the region. In light of these circumstances, the Holy Father implored, "Lay down weapons and heed the cries for peace from the poor, the people, and the innocent children." "War solves no problems," he added. "It only sows death and destruction, increases hatred, multiplies revenge. War erases the future, it erases the future." The Holy Father went on to urge all believers to take one side only: that of peace. "But not with words," he continued, "with prayer and with total dedication." In this spirit, Pope Francis encourages everyone to pray for peace.

Background on the Gospel Reading (Loyola Press)


This week's Gospel follows close behind the Gospel read last Sunday. It is the last of three questions put to Jesus by Jewish religious leaders who are trying to trick him into saying something that might get him arrested. This reminds us that the context for today's reading is the mounting tension between Jesus and the religious leaders in Jerusalem. The Herodians and the Pharisees asked the first question, which was about taxes. The Sadducees asked the second question, which was about the Resurrection (see Matthew 22:22-33). The third question, considered in today's Gospel, is asked by a Pharisee who asks Jesus about the greatest of the commandments. The question requires Jesus to interpret the Law of Moses. The Mosaic Law consists of the Ten Commandments and many additional rules, numbering over six hundred. Adherence to the Mosaic Law, for a devout Jew, is an expression of

faithfulness to God's covenant with Israel. The ranking of the Commandments was regularly debated among the teachers of the Law. Jesus answers the Pharisees' question with a two-fold summary. Jesus says that all of the commandments can be summarized in two commandments: love God and love your neighbor. Both of these were central elements of the religious tradition Jesus learned from his Jewish community. Indeed these continue to be central aspects of contemporary Jewish religious understanding. Jesus' response to his questioners proposed an integral connection between these two aspects of the Jewish Law. Love of God finds its expression in our love for our neighbour.



Family Connection: Children learn about love from real, concrete examples witnessed in family life. We can help children to love God and love their neighbors by showing everyday acts of love, generosity, and kindness—our own expressions of our love for God. These acts, small and large, are the expression of what Jesus identified as the two greatest commandments: love God and love neighbour. Make a poster together as a family. Write the words Love God in the center of the poster and write the words Love Neighbor near each of the four sides of the poster. Read together today's Gospel, Matthew 22:34-40. Talk about how Jesus taught us that our love for God is revealed in the love that we show to other people. On the poster, use pictures and words to show some of the ways that your family shows their love for other people. Pray together that your family will continue to express your love for God by loving others. Pray the Act of Love.

O my God, I love you above all things with my whole heart and soul, because you are all good and worthy of all my love. I love my neighbour as myself for the love of you. I forgive all who have injured me and I ask pardon of those whom I have injured. Amen.



Reflection: 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A

Old Rules for Fair Treatment

The first reading for the 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A outlines some of the social justice laws in ancient Israel. It specifically talks about the mistreatment of foreigners, widows, and orphans, as well as lending practices. The underlying theme is one of empathy and ethical treatment of vulnerable populations. The instruction to not mistreat or oppress a foreigner has modern relevance in discussions around immigration or minority rights.

Similarly, the call to look after widows and orphans can extend to any marginalized or vulnerable group today. We must take care of people who are easily taken advantage of. These ancient laws can guide our modern sense of social justice. Ensuring fair treatment of all, regardless of social standing, and applying ethical standards to financial and social systems, aren't just ancient religious tenets; they're practical guidelines for creating a more equitable society today.

Actions Matter In the second reading for the 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A, Paul writes a letter to the Thessalonians. He praises them for their strong faith and says they are good examples for others. The message of the gospel is spreading not just by talking, but also through real belief and changed actions. Paul says it's not just about words but also about actions that make a difference. In today's digital world, words are easy to find but they often don't do much. This tells us that actions and true belief are important if we want to really communicate. The main point is that actions matter, not just words. How we act should show our love for God and for other people.

Love and Compassion The readings for the 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A emphasize the imperative to love and show compassion to others, especially those who are vulnerable or marginalized. In Exodus, God instructs the Israelites not to mistreat foreigners, widows, or orphans and to lend to those in need without interest. In Matthew, Jesus sums up the law with the two greatest commandments: love God and love your neighbour. The laws which God gave to Israel were meant to protect the vulnerable: widows, orphans, foreigners. They were meant to alleviate suffering, and to remind the Israelites that they had also suffered and that God had rescued them. Jesus points out that the many laws were all contained in "Love God" and "Love your neighbour." This is the point of these precepts. The word used for love is "agape" which is more than just a feeling of friendship or affection. It is a love committed to action. Both passages remind us that our ethical and spiritual responsibilities are interconnected. Loving God is closely tied to how we treat others. So we are also called to love the marginalized in our world. And we must not just love them by thinking well of them. We are called to action.

Reflection Questions

- 1. How do the social justice laws outlined in Exodus relate to your understanding of current social issues, such as immigration or minority rights?
- 2. In what ways do you think the call to look after widows and orphans can extend to today's marginalized groups? Who needs my help in the world today?
- 3. Do you agree that ancient religious tenets can serve as practical guidelines for modern society? Why or why not?
- 4. Paul emphasizes actions over words in his letter to the Thessalonians. How does this message resonate with you in the context of today's digital world?
- 5. What specific actions can you take to demonstrate your love for God and neighbour, as outlined in Matthew's Gospel?
- 6. How do you interpret the use of the word "agape" for love in the Biblical context? How does this understanding influence your day-to-day actions?
- 7. Can you think of a time when you were challenged to put your love for God into action by helping someone vulnerable or marginalized? What did you learn from that experience?
- 8. How can you balance the call to action in your faith life with the practicalities and limitations of your everyday life?
- 9. What action have I taken lately to love my neighbours? Do I consider all people my neighbours, even those I have strong disagreements with?
- 10. In your opinion, how are your ethical and spiritual responsibilities interconnected?
- 11. What steps can you take to better align your actions with the teachings from these readings?

HOMILY

PROFESSION OF FAITH APOSTLES' CREED

Or the Nicene Creed may be said.

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

THE GREATEST COMMANDMENT

Communities, like the individuals that make them up, cannot exist or grow without reflecting on their stories. In remembering our past, we are reminded of lessons learnt, values shared, and obstacles overcome.

While the setting for the first reading is that of the time of the Exodus it clearly reflects the problems the Israelites faced when they had settled in the land. In order to resolve these problems, they are called to remember that they are a people where every member should be valued, especially those who cannot defend themselves. The other person is precious to God and has a dignity that is to be respected and preserved. They are reminded of their past so as to build a present that is just and equitable.

Jesus in his turn was asked what the most important commandment of the law was. The law of Moses was that formative and guiding tradition that shaped the Jewish people's self-understanding. In a sense, by asking what is the greatest commandment the Pharisees were asking, who are we? Jesus' reply is that we can only be truly ourselves when we can balance a wholehearted love of God with care for our brothers and sisters.

As Paul reflects on the history of the Thessalonian community, he praises God for the way they have overcome numerous obstacles. In the midst of opposition, they remained faithful to each other and to the Lord, so much so that they became a base for Paul's further missionary endeavour in the rest of Greece.

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
