Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday falls within the National celebration of NAIDOC Week. A week where we celebrate history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples. This year, we come together under the theme: "Sent Forth in Strength and Hope." It is Christ who sends us to walk together in faith, grounded in the deep spirituality and culture of First Nations Peoples, strengthened by the Gospel, and filled with hope for the future God is leading us into. Our Catholic Church is a tapestry woven from many cultures. From the enduring wisdom of the world's oldest continuing cultures — the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples — to those who have journeyed from distant lands, we are one Body in Christ. In our diversity, we discover richness. In our unity, we find strength. And in every heart,

we see the Spirit of God at work. Saint John Paul II once reminded us: "The Church herself is enriched by the development of different forms of culture... she takes them up in her evangelising mission and adopts them." Today, we honour that truth. We celebrate the living story of faith and culture walking hand in hand — of ancient traditions alive in Christ, and of a Church made more whole when all are welcomed, seen, and heard. The National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Council (NATSICC) invites you to enter into today's Liturgy with open hearts. May it deepen your appreciation of First Nations spirituality, draw us closer in Christ, and renew our shared calling toward reconciliation, justice, and love. may the Holy Spirit move among us and send us forth — in the strength of Christ and in the unshakable hope of the Gospel. May God bless us all on this journey together.



Background on the Gospel Reading (Loyola Press): Today's Gospel begins immediately after the final verse in last Sunday's Gospel. After strong language about the difficulties of discipleship, Jesus immediately appoints 72 people to go ahead of him to every town and place he plans to visit, proclaiming that the Kingdom of God is at hand. He sends them in pairs. In the Law of Moses two witnesses were needed for a testimony to be credible. It was probably also a safer way to travel. Jesus admits it will be difficult, that he is sending them out like lambs among wolves. Yet they are to bring nothing with them, not even a money bag or sandals. They are to greet no one on the way so as not to be

distracted from their mission. When they enter a house, their message is simply "peace." The response they will receive may be positive or negative. Either way, they are to know that the Kingdom of God is at hand. They are not to demand special treatment but eat and drink whatever is given them. They are to stay in one house and are not to look around for one that provides better accommodations. They are to heal the sick as a sign that the Kingdom of God is at hand for them. Like Jesus' miracles, healing is a sign of the coming of the kingdom. If the town will not receive them, they are to shake the dust from their feet and move on. Even in the case of such rejection they should know that the Kingdom of God is at hand. When they return from their journeys, they are rejoicing because their mission has been successful. Demons were under their power because of Jesus' name. Jesus may have sent them out as lambs among wolves, but at the conclusion of this passage he assures them that they have been given power over the enemy and nothing will harm them, not even serpents and scorpions. A key theme of today's Gospel and last Sunday's Gospel is discipleship—its challenges, its difficulties, and its rewards. Sharing in the mission of Jesus is difficult, but everyone is called to do it, not just some professionals trained for ministry. Even for us today, the harvest is plentiful. We should pray to the master of the harvest to send out workers for his harvest.



**Family Connection**: Families teach a sense of togetherness and community. It is in the family that we learn that we are dependent on one another and where we learn to work together and live together. In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus sends out the 72 disciples in pairs, a sign that we are to work together to serve the mission of the Kingdom of God. Talk about all the ways that your family works together. Talk about the various chores and tasks that family members work on together to accomplish in order to keep the household running smoothly. Read aloud Luke 10:1-12,17-20. Talk about why it was important that Jesus sent his disciples out in pairs.

your family can work more closely together to support one another and to make the household run more smoothly. Pray for the strength to overcome the temptation to be too individualistic and to recognize the need for working together as a family.

Announcement: The Canonization of Blessed Carlo Acutis and the Canonization of Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati will be on 7 September. The canonizations of the two young saints—one from the early twentieth century, the other the first twenty-first-century saint—have been greatly anticipated due to the great devotion among the faithful. Pope Leo made the choice to enrol among the number of the saints two young men from different eras who led completely different lives, but who are nonetheless united in their love for Christ and their ability to impart that love to those whose lives they touched. The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit. brothers and sisters. Amen. --

The 14th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C calls us to reflect on God's care, the message of the Cross, and the call to discipleship. Through the readings, we see the joy of trusting in God, the importance of humility, and the hope found in sharing His love with others. These themes encourage us to rejoice in God's blessings, rely on Jesus, and embrace the mission He has given us.

*Rejoicing in God's Care* - The first reading for the 14th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C reminds us to rejoice in God's care. Isaiah describes how God comforts His people, bringing joy and peace to their lives. This image of God's care is like that of a loving mother who provides for her children with tenderness and compassion. This message encourages us to trust in God, even in difficult moments. His care is constant, and His blessings are all around us. By recognizing His love in our lives, we can find strength and peace, no matter the challenges we face. Rejoicing in God's care also calls us to gratitude. We can look at the blessings in our lives and thank God for them. It helps us to see that even in times of struggle, God is present, guiding and helping us.

*Glory in the Cross* - In the second reading for the 14th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C, Paul reminds us to glory only in the Cross of Christ. The Cross shows us how much God loves us and brings salvation to the world. It is not about worldly success or personal pride, but about what Christ has done for us. This reflection on the Cross invites us to live humbly, trusting in God's plan rather than our own achievements. Paul's message shows us that our lives should centre on Jesus and His sacrifice, not on seeking approval or power from others. When we focus on the Cross, it changes how we see our lives. It helps us to embrace faith, hope, and love, even in the face of challenges. The Cross reminds us that Jesus is our greatest source of strength and that His love is always with us.

The Joy and Challenge of Discipleship - The Gospel for the 14th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C gives us a glimpse of life with Jesus and His disciples. The disciples are sent on a mission, preaching and healing in Jesus' name. Their work brings joy, even though it involves hardship. They are learning and growing, becoming more like lesus through their actions. Discipleship brings both challenges and hope. The work of sharing God's love is not always easy, but it is rewarding. We can find joy in following Jesus when we remember that He is with us and gives us the strength we need. Jesus also gives clear guidance to His disciples. He tells them to travel in pairs, rely on God, and accept the hospitality of others. He reminds them to stay humble and to move on when rejected. These instructions show us how to live as disciples today, trusting in God and focusing on the mission of love and peace.
