

When the magi had departed, behold, the angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Rise, take the child and his mother, flee to Egypt, and stay there until I tell you. Herod is going to search for the child to destroy him. (Matthew 2:13)

A Family Led by Faith (Young Catholics)

The Feast of the Holy Family Year A reminds us that Jesus lived in a real family. He had a mother and a father who cared for Him and protected Him. Mary and Joseph did not have easy lives, but they trusted God and followed His plan. Their home was simple, but it was full of love. This feast helps us think about our own families. Every home has struggles. But like the Holy Family, we are called to listen to God and care for each other with patience. Love grows in quiet moments, hard choices, and daily kindness. The readings for the Feast of the Holy Family Year A show how God works through family life. They speak about honouring parents, caring for others, and choosing peace. These small acts shape a strong and faithful home.

This day is not only about Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. It is about how we can live with love and trust in our families today. God is with us in family life, no matter how ordinary it may seem.

Reflection Questions for the Feast of the Holy Family Year A

. What is the main message of the Feast of the Holy Family Year A?

The Feast of the Holy Family Year A celebrates Jesus, Mary, and Joseph as a model for all families. It reminds us of the importance of love, respect, and faith in family life.

2. Why is honouring parents important in the first reading?

The first reading emphasizes honouring parents as a way to show gratitude and respect. It teaches that caring for parents brings blessings and reflects God's love.

3. How can we honour difficult family members?

Honouring someone does not mean ignoring harm or pain. It means treating them with respect, setting healthy boundaries, and choosing forgiveness.

4. What does mutual submission mean in marriage?

Mutual submission means spouses support each other with love and respect. It is about serving each other selflessly, just as Christ served others.

5. How does the second reading relate to family life?

The second reading encourages compassion, kindness, and patience, which are essential in family relationships. It teaches that forgiveness and love create harmony in the home.

6. What can we learn from Joseph's obedience in the Gospel?

Joseph listened to God and protected his family without hesitation. His example shows us the importance of trusting God and taking action to care for loved ones.

7. Why did the Holy Family flee to Egypt?

They fled to Egypt to escape King Herod's threat. This shows that even holy families face challenges and must rely on faith and courage.

8. What role does faith play in the Feast of the Holy Family Year A?

Faith is central, guiding the Holy Family's actions and decisions. It reminds us to trust God's plan, even in difficult times.

9. How can we apply the lessons of the Feast of the Holy Family Year A to our lives?

We can practice love, respect, and forgiveness in our families. We can also follow Joseph's example of protecting and guiding our loved ones with faith.

10. Why is the Holy Family a model for us?

The Holy Family shows us how to live with faith, love, and obedience to God. Their example helps us build stronger, faith-filled families.

Background on the Gospel Reading (Loyola Press): Today we celebrate the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. As we do so, our Gospel invites us to consider Joseph's protection of Jesus in the face of danger. Just as in the announcement of Jesus' birth, an angel appears to Joseph in a dream. The angel warns him of Herod's plans to harm Jesus. Joseph follows the command of the angel and takes Joseph and Mary to Egypt, returning only after receiving word in another dream that it was safe to do so. This feast is part of the Christmas season, so we should look at today's Gospel in the context of what Scripture tells us about Jesus' birth. Today's reading is found in the Gospel of Matthew, following the story of the visit of the Magi. Recall that Matthew's story about the birth of Jesus makes Joseph the primary character. Among Matthew's themes in this infancy narrative is Jesus as the fulfillment of the Old Testament prophecies about the messiah. Indeed, the story of the Holy Family's flight to Egypt recalls the story of Moses in the Book of Exodus. It should also be noted that today's reading omits the verses that recount Herod's order of the massacre of the infant boys in and around Bethlehem. We mark this event on the Feast of the Holy Innocents on December 28. These events remind us of the difficult reality of Jesus' birth. While the story of the Magi's visit will be recalled in our liturgy on the Feast of the Epiphany, our Christmas celebration is made more sober by the recollection that not everyone received Christ's birth with joy or obedience. Herod's jealousy and malice contrast with Joseph's obedience to the words of the angel. The Holy Family's escape to Egypt and the massacre that Jesus is saved from remind us of the struggles and sacrifices that are required as preparation for God's salvation. Family Connection: In the midst of the Christmas season, it is quite appropriate that our liturgy asks us to pause to consider the Holy Family. In today's Gospel, we hear about how Joseph protected Jesus from danger by relocating the family to Egypt in obedience to God. Following the model of the Holy Family, we might use this feast to recall the responsibility that each family member has to contribute to the good of the family and recommit ourselves to one another. Gather together as a family to work on a common project. You might prepare a meal together, prepare a special dessert, or perhaps do a craft together. When you finish, talk about how each family member contributed to the common project. Remind one another that each member of the family contributes to the good of the whole family. Recall that Jesus was also part of a family and that this Sunday we celebrate the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. Read together today's Gospel, Matthew 2:13-15, 19-23. Pray together that your family will continue to protect and care for one another as Mary and Joseph protected and cared for Jesus.
